My father is 86 years old and has AD. I would say that he is moving from stage 6 to 7. He can no longer form sentences, cannot recognize anyone, doesn't know where he is and now needs my mom to take care of his personal needs. He can still use the restroom although he doesn't always know what to do after and has been caught playing in his feces. For the last couple of months he has been sleeping most of the day. When he does wake up, mom dresses him, feeds him and gives him meds and he then goes to the couch or chair and goes back to sleep. Yesterday she could not wake him. She tried for hours and finally after shaking and speaking loudly she was able to wake him. This morning, just a few minutes ago, he woke up on his

Answer

Hello Linda: I think it's great that you are being proactive in your father's care.

It is quite common for elders with AD to begin to sleep for longer and longer periods of time as the dementia progresses. It's also possible for him to have his good days when he's more alert and responsive, as well as days when he's sleeping most of the 24 hours. If any of these changes are sudden (happening in hours or a day), I would say to have him checked for some type of infection (urinary tract is most common) as that would cause changes. It's difficult to predict how he will pass on since there could be several things that could happen. He could get a pneumonia--probably from choking on food or liquid, and then he may just slip into a coma. He could fall and break a hip which may necessitate surgery and that would be quite serious. He could have a heart attack or stroke which may cause him to die suddenly. If he dies from the AD, then it would more likely be multi-system shut-down which would probably manifest by him sleeping and then slipping into a coma.

You may wish to have hospice enter his care now to help alleviate the caregiver burden on your mother. They would also help make sure he is comfortable and would be able to predict his death better than you or I. I wish you luck Linda as you continue to help care for your father. Cindy
