Greetings from the Secretary

Greetings everyone,

Governor Tom Corbett gave his budget address to a joint session of the Pennsylvania Legislature on Tuesday. Thanks to two years of fiscal restraint, the Governor proposes some responsible spending increases. This budget spends a total of \$28.4 billion, once again spending no more than we take in. Pennsylvania's hard-working people, key location and abundant natural resources continue to give our state unlimited potential. We've created success by expanding opportunities, not raising taxes. The Governor's proposal focuses on several key areas such as education, welfare, jobs, public safety, agriculture, pensions, and transportation.

In his address the Governor also emphasized his commitment to caring for older Pennsylvanians. He recognized the growing population of older Pennsylvanians and the growing need for services. At this time one million of our older citizens depend on services which are funded by the Pennsylvanian Lottery.

As a result of changes in the management of the Lottery, the Governor's proposal adds \$50 million dollars for senior programs.

The additional funds will help to reduce the waiting list for home and community services provided by the Options program, increase funding for Attendant Care Services, provide support for the Aging Waiver program, allow for increased investment in Area Agencies on Aging and help with Senior Center modernization.

Governor Tom Corbett signed an Executive Order establishing the Pennsylvania Alzheimer's Disease Planning Committee, which is tasked with developing a State Alzheimer's Plan in 12 months that will serve as a comprehensive approach to addressing the growing number of Pennsylvanians living with Alzheimer's disease and other related brain disorders.

The order was signed at the University of Pennsylvania's School of Medicine Smilow Center for Translational Research. Distinguished speakers regarding the need to address Alzheimer's in Pennsylvania included John Trojanowski, MD, PhD Director of the Alzheimer's disease Center and the Institute on Aging of the University of Pennsylvania; Neil Resnick, MD, Chief of the Division of Geriatrics at the University of Pittsburgh and Associate Director of Strategic Planning at the Aging Institute.; Bob Marino, Co-Chair of the Pennsylvania Public Policy Coalition of the Alzheimer's Association and Board member.

Pennsylvania is fortunate to have two National Institute on Aging (NIA) Alzheimer's disease Research Centers, one at the University of Pennsylvania and the other at the University of Pittsburgh.

Rep. Kathy Watson, representing the 144th Legislative District, Chair of the Alzheimer's Caucus and former long-serving member of the House Aging and Older Adult Services Committee, now Chair of the House Children and Youth Committee and prime sponsor for House Bill 2270, which led to the Executive Order reminded all of the importance of the work that the Governor was initiating through his leadership.

Chairman Tim Hennesey of the House Aging and Older Adult Services Committee and Senator Pat Browne, Majority Whip, also spoke to those gathered of the importance of the action being taken. Democratic Chair Steve Samuelson of the House Aging and Older Adult Services Committee was also in attendance.

My thanks to Kathy Jedrziewski, PhD, Deputy Director of the Institute on Aging and all at Penn, the Pennsylvania Department of Aging and the Governor's office for their support in planning this event. Thanks also to the University of Pennsylvania for hosting the event.

Thank you to those living with Alzheimer's disease and their caregivers and advocates who joined us along with representatives of state associations whose members reach out every day to care for those living with the disease.

Finally and importantly, we thank Governor Tom Corbett for signing this Executive Order.

The Pennsylvania Council on Aging held a meeting on Wednesday and I was able to briefly welcome them and share news of the Governor's proposed budget. My thanks to Council Chair Sara Parker and to all members of the Council, and to Donna Reinaker, Executive Director of the Council.

Also on Wednesday, I attended the Pennsylvania Workforce Investment Board (WIB) meeting in Harrisburg. I serve as a member of the WIB. The WIB acts as the governor's private-sector policy advisor on a workforce development system to align with education policies and economic development goals. The Board is made up of business executives, labor officials, education leaders, economic development practitioners and local elected officials. Additionally, the cabinet secretaries of five state agencies, including Aging, as well as four members of the general assembly serve on the Board. Service on the WIB provides an opportunity to share information on the older person in the workforce as well as the need to continue to develop a workforce to help older Pennsylvanians.

On Thursday morning, I visited the West Philadelphia Senior Center. I shared information on the Governor's proposed budget, the State Plan on Aging, and the Lottery Private Management Agreement. My thanks to Director Pat Stanley, her entire team and for the participants of the West Philadelphia Senior Center for their hospitality and the opportunity to visit.

2012 Program Final Quarter

The APPRISE Program ended the final quarter of 2012 with the following numbers:

From 10/1/12 to 12/31/12 APPRISE met with a total of 34,550 individuals concerning their Medicare benefits. Staff and volunteers spent over 19,470 hours with beneficiaries.

During the same time period, the APPRISE Program held 2,645 events across the state. This number includes:

- 812 interactive presentations to the public
- 78 booths at health fairs/senior fairs
- 1,424 dedicated enrollment events
- 39 Radio Shows
- 3 TV shows
- 35 electronic media (websites, PSA, web crawls, etc.)
- 245 print activities (newspaper articles, newsletters, targeted mailings, etc.)

Archived: Paying for Dental Care Using Incurred Medical Expenses

Accessing dental care can be especially difficult for nursing home residents. Paying for dental care using Incurred Medical Expenses (IME) helps long-term care residents get dental treatment and allows dental practices to get reimbursed for services.
