

You Helped Make It Happen: Early Beginnings of the New Community Inclusion Treatment Network



Welcome ATRA's newest treatment network, the community inclusion network. It is gratifying to know that there is so much interest in community-based practice to the point of our being able to put together a new network.

The network initially came into existence via discussions between several members who attended the Annual ATRA conference in Atlanta who talked informally about a TR network represented by TRs who practice in community-based settings. By mid-February, having been contacted by Sharon Ballard, liaison for ATRA treatment networks, I agreed to participate in the start up of the new treatment network.

In order to form the new network (here's where you came in), those of us on the startup committee facilitated the submission of at least 30 member letters of support for the network's creation for submission to ATRA's Board. I reached out to every member I knew I believed would embrace the network. Many of you promptly responded by writing and submitting marvelous letters of support.

Those of us on the start-up committee also needed to submit examples of journal articles, past presentations, chapters in books, or actual books about community TR to seal the deal. This is a part of the process of formulating new treatment networks.



Now, a little about the folks who are actively involved at this juncture. Although there is no official leader that has been established at this point, Alayne Kaizan, Cindy Covey and myself are currently dividing responsibilities in order to provide the initial leadership for the network.

Alayne works for the Cincinnati Recreation Commission in the division of therapeutic recreation. She is the program's inclusion coordinator. She has worked there for almost three years after 22 years in "clinical" settings. Alayne works with many different people with varying needs and abilities. Her program offers segregated recreation programs such as adapted sports, leisure education, social and arts programs for adults and children. She also provides leadership and expertise for the Department's ADA compliance and implementation.

Cindy works for Little Rock Parks and Recreation. She works mostly with children and adolescents with a mixture of disabilities such as autism, MR, CP, sensory deficits and Down Syndrome.

Dementia Practitioners Certification

Are you a CTRS who works with individuals who have dementia? If so, you may be interested in obtaining an additional certification as a Certified Dementia Practitioner (CDP). This is a national certification available to professionals from diverse backgrounds, including Therapeutic Recreation. It is offered through the National Council of Certified Dementia Practitioners (NCCDP).

The goal of the NCCDP is to encourage comprehensive standards of excellence in direct care skills, education and sensitivity in the area of dementia care. The NCCDP offers their national certification (Certified Dementia Practitioners/CDP) to those individuals who successfully complete a comprehensive Alzheimer's and Dementia curriculum.

The courses, seminars and workshops must be submitted for review and approved by the NCCDP. Certification is for a two-year period, during which time, the individual must continue to further their dementia education/training in order to become recertified.

The NCCDP also offers comprehensive dementia training as well as a train-the-trainer course to health care facilities, school systems, universities, fire and rescue squads, and law enforcement.

The NCCDP was formed in 2001 by a group of professionals with varying work and personal experiences in the field of dementia care. Their backgrounds include Therapeutic Recreation, Nursing, Psychiatry, Social Work, Long Term Care Administration, Elder Law and Home Care Administration.

The council was formed to promote standards of excellence in dementia education to professionals and other caregivers who provide services to dementia clients.



ACTION ALERT

The NJ/EPA TR Association was instrumental in initiating an ACTION ALERT! Our organization monitors public policy in NJ and PA by reviewing the state Registers. In April a new rule was proposed entitled: Intensive In-Community Mental Health Rehabilitation Services Under the Partnership for Children: Behavioral Assistance Services, and made public in the New Jersey Register. This proposed regulation does not list recreational therapy as a professional service for children requiring mental health rehabilitation in the new community based model.

Upon discovery of this omission, we e-mailed information about the proposed regulation to the ATRA Coverage and Reimbursement and Public Policy teams. The wheels started in motion very quickly. ATRA leaders worked to research the proposed regulation, contact influential people in NJ, gather supportive information and documents, write the action alert and generate a sample letter. NTRS President, Fran Daly, joined efforts with her knowledge and contacts in NJ and coordinated conference calls.

It was very interesting to be part of this process; participating in conference calls with ATRA and NTRS leaders, networking with recreational therapy professionals, brainstorming for the best way and words to make our comments ~ why was recreational therapy omitted? Finally, getting the word out to many of the Recreation Therapists who live and work in New Jersey, so they could lend support to our efforts. It was very fortunate our Spring Workshop was held at Kean University and over 30 Certified Recreational Therapists from the area were expected to be in attendance. NJ/EPA TR Association used this opportunity to alert the participants of the proposed rule and to watch for an Action Alert. When the sample letter was drafted and ready to be used for comment, we used our list serve to contact each member.

It is our hope that you took this opportunity to be involved in public policy. It's imperative that we all take responsibility for letting legislators know that recreational therapy must be available to eligible recipients. The leaders of this project also contacted administrators, university professors, clients, families and therapists who had worked with recreational therapists, to write letters and support our efforts. We are particularly grateful to those outside our discipline who recognize the importance of what we do and support us by helping to advocate for TR services.

The comment period for this proposed regulation ended on April 30, 2004. We will continue to monitor the New Jersey Register to determine the impact of the Action Alert. ATRA and NJ/EPA TR Association lobby for our profession and the valuable services we provide!

The City of Philadelphia Mayor's Commission for the Disabled: Recreation Committee

A small group of individuals have recently joined together under the leadership of Isabel Bohn (Director of Pennsylvania Center of Adapted Sports) to address concerns about the recreation services provided to individuals with disabilities in Philadelphia. The group has a variety of members including but not limited to, several recreational therapists and disabled athletes. Currently, the committee has been addressing three areas of need.

The first is a centralized database of community resources for regional programs. Our best efforts to date include the integration of the various components of the Philadelphia Department of Recreation's website, to make it user friendly. The Accessibility Information website (www.phila.gov/aco) was not linked to the Recreation Department information website (www.phila.gov/ recreation). Effort is being made to get out the word that existing facilities and programs are available to meet the needs of some individuals with disabilities and that a system is in place for consumers with disabilities to request modifications to facilitate their participation if a barrier is present. Additionally, information was distributed regarding the "Pennsylvania State Database of Recreation and Leisure Services for Persons with Disabilities" currently maintained by the Department of Health (877,986,4550), Although this database is not accessible electronically it is the most comprehensive option available within Pennsylvania at present. With encouragement from individuals throughout various parts of the state – the database administrators may consider conversion to a web-based system. Both of these solutions are incomplete and leave significant holes in attaining the goal of a centralized database of community recreation resources for regional programs. Further options across state lines are needed. This issue has yet to be resolved.

A second area of need is for an active and comprehensive "Learn to Swim" program. Philadelphia currently has three indoor year-round swimming programs. The committee hopes to increase the knowledge and skill of the staff leading these programs in regards to the needs of individuals with physical disabilities. A plan is in the works for staff training during the fall of 2004.

The final area of need, the committee is addressing, is for increased recreation programming for individuals with disabilities throughout the city. Currently one or two recreation centers, in each of the thirteen districts, are being evaluated to determine options and establish a plan to achieve the desired increased programming. Staff from the Department of Recreation are members of the committee and have been invaluable links in this process.

It has been inspiring to collaborate with individuals from the public, private and university affiliated systems – all united to improve recreation opportunities for individuals with disabilities!
