A U.S. study of older adults found 26% reported pain two years before they died, with pain levels rising four months before death. About 46% of people reported moderate or severe pain in the month before they died. The researchers also found pain was more common among arthritis patients, 60% of whom reported experiencing moderate to severe pain one month before their death compared with 26% of those without the condition.
