New Study Shows Increase Rates of Drug Related Admission

Hospitalizations due to adverse effects of prescription, over-the-counter and illegal drugs rose by 117% for people ages 45 to 64 and by 87% for those aged 85 and older from 1997 to 2008, the Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality reported. Pain Levels Increase in Older Adults Before Death

A U.S. study of older adults found 26% reported pain two years before they died, with pain levels rising four months before death. About 46% of people reported moderate or severe pain in the month before they died. The researchers also found pain was more common among arthritis patients, 60% of whom reported experiencing moderate to severe pain one month before their death compared with 26% of those without the condition. <u>Read more.</u>

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
