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

"Debbie's professional demeanor with co-workers, residents and their families is calming and reassuring," said Director of Nursing Sally Jo Magness. "Each resident's


individual needs are Debbie's most important concern."

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Rehabilitation Clinic opens on Louisville campus

rthopaedic rehabilitation specialist Dr. Kenneth A. Mook has opened a clinic in the Village Community Center to serve the public and Louisville campus residents.

The new clinic dovetails with the Masonic Homes expanded therapy services program that provides occupational, physical and speech therapies, according to Chief Operating Officer J Scott Judy. "We are pleased to offer even more rehabilitation services on our campus, led by Dr. Mook and his outstanding program."

A specialist in amputation and orthopaedic rehabilitation, Dr. Mook received his master's and doctorate from the University of Louisville and completed his residency in Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation at Frazier Institute in Louisville. Dr. Mook is board certified through the American Board of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation.
