R03: Wanted: Quality Dementia Care - we need the whole gang

Dementia care in the Senior Living organization environment has evolved from heavy medication and physical restraints to an emphasis on dignity, respect, and person-centered care for the resident. The direct care staff is more knowledgeable in the subject, and leadership maintains a vigilant eye to ensure the staff's touch is soft and caring. However, for the resident, the dementia condition still makes life stop on 'strange'. This education focuses on what makes a dementia unit 'special' and how does the organization and the staff bring life back toward 'familiar and alive'.
